Temple Health Supports Donors and Family Husband, Wife Become Heroes Together

A family's generosity combined with strong collaboration between *Gift of Life* and Temple University Hospital staff recently made it possible for a married couple to save and heal lives through donation in a unique case.

Felix and Maria Nunez, married more than 40 years, were hospitalized following a fire at their home. During their admission in the Burn ICU, the couple was placed in adjoining rooms so they could remain side by side. Sadly, their injuries were not survivable. The couple and their large family received extraordinary support from the hospital team throughout the clinical care process.

The couple, both in their 60s, then became heroes together on the same day. Felix successfully donated his liver and Maria donated bone, skin and corneas to heal dozens of people. Their legacy as donors provides comfort and hope to their grieving family.

"Our team was privileged to support this special family and work with *Gift of Life* to provide them with a heroic legacy for both of their parents through donation. LOVE, Laughter and Joy

Born with failing kidneys, **Melika Rose received a life-saving transplant when she was 10 years old. She spent her teen years raising awareness about the critical importance of organ donation.** She even hosted kick-boxing classes to raise money and, with her aunt's help, started a foundation called Kidney Kicks. Proceeds went to Children's Hospital of Philadelphia where Melika received her transplant.

Melika enjoyed almost a decade with her transplanted kidney: **"We had ten good years, which gave us plenty of love, laughter and joy," said her mom, Debra.** Sadly, Melika died at age 19, awaiting a second transplant. She became a cornea donor to help others as she was helped by the kindness of a donor hero.



I Found My Life's PURPOSE

It's been more than 20 years since **Earl Jones received his life-saving heart transplant – a gift that allowed him to enjoy seeing his daughter and son grow to adulthood** and become parents themselves.

Earl had an active childhood despite a genetic heart defect. His life dramatically changed at age 30 when persistent coughing and an emergency room visit revealed he was in congestive heart failure. He waited about two months in the hospital before receiving his healthy new heart from his donor hero, a 22-year-old man.

Earl shares his story to help others make an informed decision about the vital choice to sign up as a donor. **"I think after all these years, I've finally found my life's mission and my life's purpose. I'm living testimony to the power of transplantation."**

"Discussing organ donation in the African American community is pretty much taboo. But the need is so real," said Debra. **"I know the joy and the pain associated with organ donation. We can't escape our mortality. We don't know when or how, but we do know we can make a difference. Please sign up to be an organ donor and let your family know your wishes."**

PREVENT THE NEED FOR A TRANSPLANT

- ✓ Get an annual health checkup.
 - ✓ Check your blood pressure often. See your doctor if it is above 140/90.
 - ✓ Go for a walk – now. Being physically active for at least 30 minutes a day cuts the risk of obesity, high blood pressure and diabetes.
 - ✓ Choose water instead of sugary drinks.
 - ✓ Maintain a healthy weight and stop smoking. Help is available from your doctor.

Waiting for a SECOND CHANCE

The news was devastating when Brianna Bailey experienced kidney failure in 2019: "When I found out I needed to go on dialysis, my first thought was, 'I'm gonna die,'" she said. Brianna has Type 2 diabetes, which affects more than 90 percent of the 37 million people with diabetes in the U.S.

For more than three years, **Brianna's father, Brian, has been by her side as she waits for the transplant that will give her a second chance at life.** The wait can be a grueling five to seven years for a matching kidney to become available from a deceased donor. **Brian said he wasn't signed up as an organ donor before his daughter's health crisis but that quickly changed as he realized how great the need is.**

While they wait, Brian wants everyone to know that the need for a life-saving transplant can affect themselves or their loved ones: "Anyone in your family – you never know. Young, old – it can be anyone," he said.
